

In 2003 Millicent Rotary Club "adopted" the long neglected 2.4 hectare block bounded by Williams Road, Battye Street, Park Tce and the Lakeside Cara Park whilst looking for a major project to mark the Centenary of Rotary International in 2005. Known a the "scrub block" it had been largely over-taken by range of woody feral plant species. A plan was developed to turn the area into a Park that the community could enjoy. Advice was sought from Wattle Range Council, the Dept. of Environment, at the Native Vege- tation Council. With a governmen Envro Fund Grant made available, work commence The offending vegetation was removed and a walky through the Park was added in the shape of an "R" signify it as a Rotary Project.
